# 12th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

#### I CORINTHIANS 15

1 Moreover, brethren, I declare to you the gospel which I preached to you, which also you received and in which you stand, 2 by which also you are saved, if you hold fast that word which I preached to you- -unless you believed in vain. 3 For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins of according to the Scriptures, 4 and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day of according to the Scriptures, 5 and that He was seen by Cephas, then by the twelve. 6 After that He was seen by over five hundred brethren at once, of whom the greater part remain to the present, but some have fallen asleep. 7 After that He was seen by James, then by all the apostles. 8 Then last of all He was seen by me also, as by one born out of due time. 9 For I am the least of the apostles, who am not worthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. 10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace toward me was not in vain; but I labored more abundantly then they all, yet not I but the grace of God which was with me. 11 Therefore, whether it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

# HE WAS SEEN BY CEPHAS, THEN BY THE TWELVE. AFTER THAT... BY MORE THAN FIVE HUNDRED BRETHREN AT ONCE... LAST OF ALL HE WAS SEEN BY ME ALSO

Having finished the discourse on spiritual gifts, he passes all on to the most necessary of all: the subject of the resurrection. For in this, too, they were very unsound. And as in men's bodies, when the fever lays actual hold on their solid parts - I mean the nerves and the veins and the primary elements - the mischief becomes incurable unless it receives much attention, at that time something very similar was likely to happen. The mischief was proceeding to the very elements of godliness. This is why Paul also uses great earnestness. For his discourse was not of morals... but about the very sum of all good things. They were at variance touching the resurrection itself. The devil was taking a vehement stand against the resurrection because this was our great hope... Paul, writing to Timothy, called it gangrene... saying, 'Of whom is Hymenaeus and Philetus, who concerning the truth have erred, saying that the resurrection is past already, and overthrow the faith of some' (II Tim. 2:17,18). At one time they spoke this way, but at another time they said that the body does not rise again but the resurrection is the purification of the soul. But these things that wicked demon persuaded them to say... To show that all the things done for our sakes are a fable. For if they were persuaded that there is no resurrection of bodies, he would have gradually persuaded them that neither was Christ raised... Paul puts this before us with much exactness, going over all of it...

#### **MATTHEW 19**

16 Now behold, one came and said to Him, "Good Teacher, what good thing shall I do that I may have eternal life?" 17 So He said to him, "Why do you call Me good? No one is good but One, that is, God. But if you want to enter into life, keep the commandments." 18 He said to Him, "Which ones?" Jesus said, "You shall not murder,' 'You shall not commit adultery,' You shall not steal,' 'You shall not bear false witness,' 19 'Honor your father and your mother,' and, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself." 20 The young man said to Him, "All these things I have kept from my youth. What do I still lack?" 21 Jesus said to him, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." 22 But when the young man heard that saying, he went away sorrowful, for he had great possessions. 23 Then Jesus said to His disciples, "Assuredly, I say to you that it is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. 24 "And again I say to you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle then for a rich man to enter the kingdom of." 25 When His disciples heard it, they were exceedingly amazed, saying, "Who then can be saved?" 26 But Jesus looked at them and say to them, "With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

#### NO ONE IS GOOD BUT ONE, THAT IS, GOD

Why then does Christ reply to him in this manner, saying, 'There is none good?' Because He came to Him as a mere man, and one of the common sort, and a Jewish teacher; for this cause then He discourses with him as a man. Indeed, in many instances He replies to the secret thoughts of those who come to Him.

#### GOOD TEACHER, WHAT GOOD DEED MUST I DO TO HAVE ETERNAL LIFE?

To the youth's stirring and awesome question of the Savior, as though angrily, answers, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good except the One God.' If I am just a teacher, then I am not sufficiently good, divinely good and powerful, to be able to solve the question of eternal life. Only someone who has eternal life and can give eternal life can solve that question. If I am just a teacher – and that means just a man, and not God and Lord – then I am not in a position to solve your question... No one is sufficiently good to be able to give the greatest good: eternal life. Only the Perfect Good – and this is God, the God-Man – knows and has the Perfect Life, Eternal Life, and can give it – and solve in every way the problem of eternal life on earth.
