# Pentecost Sunday Acts 2:1-11

# The Holy Spirit Comes at Pentecost

In those days: When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. And they were amazed and wondered, saying, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians, we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God."

# John 7:37-52 & 8:12

On the last and greatest day of the feast of Booths, Jesus stood up and cried out: "If anyone thirsts, let him come to me; let him drink who believes in me. Scripture has it: From within him rivers of living water shall flow." Here he was referring to the Spirit, whom those that came to believe in him were to receive. There was, of course, no Spirit as yet, since Jesus had not yet been glorified. Some in the crowd who heard these words began to say, "This must be the Prophet." Others were claiming, "He is the Messiah. But an objection was raised: "Surely the Messiah is not to come from Galilee? Does not Scripture say that the Messiah, being of David's family, is to come from Bethlehem, the village where David lived?" In this fashion the crowd was sharply divided over Jesus. Some of them even wanted to apprehend him. However, no one laid hands on him. When the temple guards came back, the chief priests and Pharisees asked them, "Why did you not bring him in?' The guards replied, "No man ever spoke like that before." The Pharisees retorted, "Do not tell us you too have been taken in! You do not see any of the Sanhedrin believing in him, do you? Or the Pharisees? Only this lot, that knows nothing about the law - and they are lost anyway!" One of their own number, Nicodemus (the man who had come to Jesus [by night]), spoke up to say, "Since when does our law condemn any man without first hearing him and knowing the facts?" They taunted him: "Do not tell us you are a Galilean too! Look it up. You will not find the Prophet coming from Galilee." Jesus spoke to the people once again: "I am the light of the world. No follower of mine shall ever walk in darkness; no, he shall possess the light of life."

**Pentecost**, also known as **Whitsunday**, is a significant feast in the Christian liturgical calendar. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ, as described in the New Testament book of Acts (Acts 2:1-4). Here are some key points about Pentecost in the Byzantine tradition:

#### 1. Fulfillment of Promise and Hope:

- The Byzantine liturgy celebrates Pentecost as the fulfillment of God's promise. Jesus Christ assured His Apostles that He would send them the "promise of the Father" (Luke 24:49).
- The descent of the Holy Spirit brought to completion the divine revelation of the Holy Trinity, which St. Gregory the Theologian called the "great and exalted mystery."
- Pentecost marks the achievement of hope and the fulfillment of God's plan for salvation.

### 2. St. Gregory the Theologian's Homily:

- St. Gregory the Theologian delivered a famous homily titled "On the Holy Spirit" in Constantinople on the day of Pentecost in 381 A.D.
- According to St. Gregory, the descent of the Holy Spirit is the fulfillment of God's promise, surpassing even the Apostles' expectations.
- This homily emphasizes the mystery of the Holy Trinity and the role of the Holy Spirit in completing the work of Christ.

### 3. Theophany and Renewal:

- Pentecost is considered a theophany—a revelation of God. It is comparable to other significant theophanies, such as Moses on Mt. Sinai or the Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor.
- On this day, believers experience personal renewal, akin to their own baptism into Christ and sealing by the Holy Spirit.
- It is a time for spiritual progress, thirsting after God, and advancing in God's Kingdom through the work of the Holy Spirit.

In summary, Pentecost is a joyous celebration in the Byzantine tradition, emphasizing the fulfillment of God's promise, the mystery of the Holy Trinity, and the transformative power of the Holy Spirit. Alleluia!
