Opportunities to Help with Fundraising....we are called into service

Currently, our parish is unable to exist without fundraising initiatives. Our most successful venture over the years has proved to be the traditional pierogi and European baked goods made in our commercial kitchen and sold at the various local Farmers' Market venues. Volunteers are always needed to help with the baking and selling. Cleaning the work areas and equipment is also a welcome opportunity to serve (can be an evening after work). You are always needed, even if it is for a couple of hours.

The Winter Carmel Market started October 19 and continues every Saturday until March 29, 2025. Bakery activities continue Tuesday through Friday. Please contact Father Mykhaylo, to schedule a workable day and time (Tuesday through Saturday) for you and/or your family.

Opportunities For Service At St. Athanasius

- This year's Winter Market (Oct 19 March 29) has begun and requires at least one able-bodied volunteer every Saturday morning at 6:40 AM at the church hall to load the van with products, drive the van to the market, unload the van, reload the van with unsold products at market close (noon), drive the van back to the hall, unload the van, take product inventory and store products appropriately in the hall. Additional volunteers, at least 2, are needed to sell products (9:00-noon) at the market. Someone is needed to manage this.
- Pierogi pinchers and bakers are always needed (Tuesday through Friday with pierogi making typically on Wednesday).
- Our worship space needs to be kept maintained; plants watered, candles filled, carpet vacuumed.
- Our social space needs to be kept clean and organized, including bathrooms. Please clean up chairs as well as tables in the hall.
- Items for the food pantry are always needed; (food [cans with pop tops are appreciated], toiletries, cereal, carton milk, crackers, peanut butter)
- Bags for the food pantry need to be assembled every week.
- In the garden: soil preparation, fall planting of garlic, leaves for mulching
- Plastic grocery bags are needed for the food pantry and market sales.

35th Sunday after Pentecost

1 Timothy 1:15-17

A reading from the first Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to Timothy. My son, Timothy: The saying is sure and worthy of full accep-tance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. And I am the foremost of sinners; but I received mercy for this rea-son, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience for an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Luke 18: 35-43

At that time as Jesus drew near Jericho a blind man sat at the side of the road begging. Hearing a crowd go by the man asked, "What is that?" The answer came that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. The blind man shouted out, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!" Those in the lead sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out all the more, "Son of David, have pity on me!" Jesus halted and ordered that the man be brought to him. When the blind man had come close, Jesus asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" "Lord," he answered, "I want to see." Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight. Your faith has healed you." At that very moment he

was given his sight and began to follow Jesus, giving God the glory. All the people witnessed it and they too gave praise to God.

The blind man's plea also parallels the humble dependence of the tax collector in Luke 18:9–14. The opening of the eyes of the blind shows the presence of the end times, in which God through his Son begins to transform the world (4:18; 7:22) and which the Church continues to do today by his power and in his name until he comes. However, as then, so now, deliverance from spiritual blindness requires a response of faith. The healing of the blind man is an expression of Jesus' affection and mercy for the poor and the outcast. Jesus continues to show compassion even when the pressure of official authority on him becomes unbearable. When many would step aside or hide, he does not cease to serve. Hence, Jesus' compassion and the spiritual sensitivity of the poor and the outcast are two key themes of Luke. This Evangelist speaks simply and clearly: "Jesus of Nazareth is the promised Messiah of the lineage of David, who performs the works of the "eschaton" (end times) for all who are ready to receive them through the response of faith." His ministry becomes a cause for the glory and praise of God.

Jerusalem is near, but Jesus continues to serve. Luke invites: "See Who Jesus is as the blind man did! Sight is primarily a matter of the heart, not just the eyes..." We, who carry within us the new life of Jesus, and therefore call ourselves Christians, must imitate our Lord... God wants to establish His Kingdom in the heart of every person, and therefore in the whole earth. He continues to generously sow His Word (Mk 4:1–20), which is living and active (Heb 4:12). However, "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12:24). God wants to free us from inner blindness, but for this our desire to see the world

through God's eyes must be manifested through inner purification, which the Gospel calls repentance.
