TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Brethren: Now I would remind you, brethren, in what terms I preached to you the gospel, which you received, in which you stand, by which you are saved, if you hold it fast-unless you believed in vain. For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Ce'phas, then to the Twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the Church of God.

But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God which is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

Matthew 19: 16-26

At that time a man came up to Jesus and said: "Teacher, what good must I do to possess everlasting life?" Jesus answered, "Why do you question me about what is good? There is one who is good. If you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments." "Which ones?" he asked. Jesus replied, "You shall not kill'; You shall not commit adultery'; 'You shall not steal'; "You shall not bear false witness'; Honor your father and your mother'; and 'Love your neighbor as yourself." The young man said to Jesus, "I have kept all these; what do I need to do further?" Jesus told him, "If you seek perfection, go, sell your possessions, and give to the poor. You will then have treasure in heaven. Afterwards come back and follow me." Hearing these words, the young man went away sad, for his possessions were many.

Jesus said to his disciples: "I assure you, only with difficulty will a rich man enter into the kingdom of God. I repeat what | said: it is easier for a camel to pass through a needle's eye than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." When the disciples heard this they were completely overwhelmed, and exclaimed, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For man it is impossible; but for God all things are possible."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"When the disciples heard this, they were greatly astonished and said, then who can be saved?" (Matthew 19:25)

John Chrysostom: What then is Christ? It is hard for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of Heaven (Matthew 19:23). With these words, Christ does not condemn wealth, but those who are addicted to it. But if it is hard for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of Heaven, what can be said about the greedy? If not giving from one's possessions to another is already an obstacle on the way to the Kingdom, then imagine what fire is gathered by one who seizes another's property! But why did Christ tell His disciples that it is hard for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of Heaven when they were poor and even had nothing?

In order to teach them not to be ashamed of poverty and, as it were, to justify before them why He had previously advised them not to have anything. Having said here that it is difficult for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of Heaven, he goes on to show that it is impossible, not just impossible, but also extremely impossible, which he explains with the example of a camel and a needle's eye. It is easier, he says, for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God. And from this it is clear that a considerable reward awaits those who, despite their wealth, know how to live wisely. Therefore, Christ calls such a way of life a work of God, in order to show that

much grace is needed for those who want to live this way. (John Chrysostom, "Homily on the Gospel of Matthew," 63.2).

"Jesus looked at them intently and said, 'With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26)

John Chrysostom: When the disciples were astonished at his words, he continued, saying, 'With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." But why are the disciples troubled, being poor and even too poor? What worries them? Because they had too strong a love for all humanity and, having already taken on the position of its teachers, they feared for others, for the salvation of all people. It was this thought that troubled them so much that they were in great need of comfort. Therefore, Jesus, looking at them first, said: What is impossible with men is possible with God (Luke 18:27).

With a gentle and quiet look, He calmed their agitated thoughts and resolved their amazement (this is what the evangelist also indicates with the word looked), and then He encourages them with words, pointing to the power of God and thus awakening hope in them. And if you want to know how the impossible can be possible, then listen. After all, Christ did not say: with men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible, so that you would weaken in spirit and distance yourself from the work of salvation, as impossible. No, He said this so that you, realizing the magnitude of the matter, would all the more quickly take up the cause of salvation and, with God's help, embark on the path of these wonderful feats, receive eternal life.
